(For Immediate Release: April 26, 2022, NEW YORK)—Carnegie Hall today announced programming for its 2022–2023 season, including more than 150 concerts by many of the world's leading artists and ensembles, plus a wide range of innovative education and social impact programs created by Carnegie Hall's Weill Music Institute, serving audiences in New York City and beyond.

Programming highlights include two Perspectives series curated by acclaimed artists—pianist **Mitsuko Uchida** and singer-songwriter and multi-instrumentalist **Rhiannon Giddens**; and the appointment of award-winning flutist and innovator **Claire Chase** to hold the Richard and Barbara Debs Creative Chair.

"Since Carnegie Hall reopened from its extended closure seven months ago, it has been inspiring to see how much it has meant to artists, audiences, trustees, supporters, and staff to come together and enjoy live performances by amazing artists from all around the world," said **Clive Gillinson**, Carnegie Hall's Executive and Artistic Director. "Because New York City's extraordinary cultural offerings have been available to audiences in this great city for as long as anyone can remember, it has been easy to take

them for granted. Since the pandemic closed everything down for so long, audiences everywhere have come to appreciate anew just what an incredibly rich destination this is for arts and culture, and how, without them, every great city loses its heart and soul."

"As we reach the final months of this reopening season, we are thrilled to look ahead to our incredible line-up of performances for 2022–2023," he continued. "It's a year anchored by series specially curated by our exceptional Perspectives and Debs artists, providing greater insight into the worlds of these phenomenal musicians with programs that open doors to beloved repertoire, the shared history of different musical traditions, and ambitious new works. Overall, we have created a season filled with superb programs by the leading artists of our time, spanning early music to works written today, building on Carnegie Hall's aspiration to be a home for the best of every genre of music—a place where people of all ages and areas of life are inspired to come and explore."

2022-2023 Carnegie Hall Season Overview

Carnegie Hall's 2022–2023 season kicks off on Thursday, September 29 with a festive Opening Night Gala concert by **The Philadelphia Orchestra**, led by Music Director **Yannick Nézet-Séguin**, performing music by Ravel, Dvořák, and Gabriela Lena Frank. Pianist **Daniil Trifonov** is featured soloist for this special musical occasion, performing Liszt's Piano Concerto No. 1.

Curated concert series by three acclaimed musicians are programmatic focuses in 2022–2023. One of the most beloved artists of our time, pianist **Mitsuko Uchida** curates a multi-event Perspectives series next season, treating audiences to some of the repertoire for which she is most renowned. In this launch year of her Perspectives—which will take place over the next three seasons—Ms. Uchida will be featured in solo and concerto performances, in her long-term collaboration with the **Mahler Chamber Orchestra**, and in public talks and master classes with aspiring musicians of the next generation.

Singer-songwriter and multi-instrumentalist **Rhiannon Giddens** curates a four-concert Perspectives next season, shining a light on the shared history of a variety of musical traditions around the world, the complex history of Black influence in American music, and more. Giddens joins three other leading female banjo players for *Songs of Our Native Daughters*, drawing on historic sources and personal narratives to bring to life stories of struggle, resistance, and hope from a powerful Black female perspective. She performs twice during her Perspectives with multi-instrumentalist and frequent collaborator **Francesco Turrisi**, including a program featuring songs from their Grammy Award-winning album *They're Calling Me Home*, recorded in Ireland during the COVID-19 lockdown. Giddens also collaborates with women and non-binary members of the **Silkroad Ensemble** (of which she was recently appointed artistic director) and Tuscarora/Taino singer-songwriter **Pura Fé** on a program connecting the music of indigenous North America to the world.

Flutist and innovator **Claire Chase** is holder of the Richard and Barbara Debs Creative Chair for the 2022–2023 season. As part of her residency, she presents the continuation of *Density 2036*—her 24-year project to commission an expansive body of music for the flute—leading up to the centennial of Varèse's groundbreaking 1936 flute solo, *Density 21.5*. Chase's Debs programs will revisit early *Density* works and include the world premiere of a new work by Icelandic composer Anna Thorvaldsdottir, commissioned by Carnegie Hall. Chase's residency also includes a program paying tribute to her late mentor Pauline Oliveros in advance of her 90th birthday, as well as her Carnegie Hall solo orchestral debut, performing Kaija Saariaho's *Aile du songe* with the **Helsinki Philharmonic Orchestra** led by **Susanna Mälkki**.

Stemming from these three Perspectives and Debs series—curated by and featuring many leading female artists—a thread runs through Carnegie Hall's entire 2022–2023 season focusing on the contributions made by women in every facet of music. This includes conductors leading some of today's top orchestras, vocalists and instrumentalists, composers who have made history like Clara Schumann and Florence Price as well as those who are among the most exciting creatives working today. The scope of their artistry, both onstage and off, will be explored throughout the year with more programming details to come.

Highlights of Carnegie Hall's 2022–2023 season will also include performances by many of the finest orchestras from around the world, including the **City of Birmingham Orchestra** with Music Director **Mirga Gražinytė-Tyla** and the **Los Angeles Philharmonic** with Music and Artistic Director **Gustavo Dudamel**, with both orchestras making their first Carnegie Hall appearances in more than 30 years; and the **Helsinki Philharmonic Orchestra** performing for the first time at Carnegie Hall since 1968 under the direction of Chief Conductor **Susanna Mälkki**.

The new season features concerts by Andris Nelsons with the Boston Symphony Orchestra; Yannick Nézet-Séguin with both The Philadelphia Orchestra and The MET Orchestra; Gianandrea Noseda with the National Symphony Orchestra; Kirill Petrenko with the Berliner Philharmoniker (in his first appearances as the orchestra's Chief Conductor); Christian Thielemann with the Vienna Philharmonic; and Franz Welser-Möst with The Cleveland Orchestra.

In October 2022, **Marin Alsop** leads the **São Paulo Symphony Orchestra** for its first-ever Carnegie Hall performance with a program including Rimsky-Korsakov's *Sheherazade* and works by illustrious 20th-century Brazilian composer Heitor Villa-Lobos.

In February 2023, the **Lviv National Philharmonic Orchestra of Ukraine** and Principal Guest Conductor **Theodore Kuchar** will make their Carnegie Hall debut with a program to include music by Brahms and Dvořák. Ukrainian-American pianist **Stanislav Khristenko** joins the orchestra in his Stern Auditorium / Perelman Stage debut performing Tchaikovsky's Piano Concerto No. 1.

Orchestra of St. Luke's performs three times next season with Bernard Labadie, who recently renewed his contract as Principal Conductor through OSL's 50th anniversary season in 2024–2025. OSL's schedule next season includes an all-Mendelssohn concert with David Hyde Pierce narrating *A Midsummer Night's Dream* and Benjamin Grosvenor performing the Piano Concerto No. 1; music by Mozart with pianist Emanuel Ax, and an all-Handel program featuring soprano Joélle Harvey, countertenor lestyn Davies, bass-baritone Matthew Brook, and La Chapelle de Québec.

Celebrating the 150th birthday of Sergei Rachmaninoff, pianist **Yuja Wang** joins **Yannick Nézet-Séguin** and **The Philadelphia Orchestra** for an unprecedented program in January 2023 featuring all four of the composer's piano concertos, plus the *Rhapsody on a Theme of Paganini*, marking the first time that the complete concertos will ever have been performed together at Carnegie Hall.

Also featured in 2022–2023: the **Sphinx Virtuosi**, a chamber orchestra featuring alumni of the prestigious Sphinx Competition, return this fall with a concert that culminates the 25th anniversary year of the Sphinx Organization; and the Hall's traditional December concerts with the **New York String Orchestra** conducted by **Jaime Laredo**.

The English Concert and Artistic Director Harry Bicket return in spring 2023 as part of their multi-year Handel opera/oratorio project at Carnegie Hall, performing Handel's *Solomon* with Swedish mezzosoprano Ann Hallenberg singing the title role, joined by sopranos Christina Gansch (Solomon's Queen) and Elena Villalón (Queen of Sheba). Other early music highlights include performances by Concerto Köln with soprano Jeanine De Bique; L'Arpeggiata with Artistic Director Christina Pluhar and countertenor Philippe Jaroussky; two concerts with conductor and harpsichordist William Christie, including a recital with violinist Théotime Langlois de Swarte and performance with Les Arts Florissants, plus more.

In addition to concerts curated by Debs Creative Chair Claire Chase, contemporary music offerings next season include **Ensemble Intercontemporain**'s first Carnegie Hall appearance in 20 years under the baton of Music Director **Matthias Pintscher**; as well as new works co-commissioned by Carnegie Hall, performed by **American Composers Orchestra**, **The Crossing**, **Danish String Quartet**, **Ensemble Connect**, **Kronos Quartet**, **Miró Quartet**, **Samora Pinderhughes**, **Sphinx Virtuosi**, **yMusic**, **Third Coast Percussion** with choreographers and movement artists **Jon Boogz** & **Lil Buck**, and more.

Cellist **Alisa Weilerstein** curates and performs the New York premiere of her new project *Fragments* with Bach's Cello Suite No. 1 in G Major woven together with new works co-commissioned by Carnegie Hall, responsive lighting, and scenic architecture.

Featured among a wide variety of vocal and instrumental performances next season are a number of performances featuring all-star duos, including recitals by mezzo-soprano **Anne-Sofie von Otter** with fortepianist **Kristian Bezuidenhout**; soprano **Renée Fleming** with pianist **Evgeny Kissin**; and violinist **Joshua Bell** with pianist **Daniil Trifonov**.

In addition to Mitsuko Uchida's solo appearance as part of her Perspectives, many of the world's leading and rising star pianists will appear in recital, including Leif Ove Andsnes, Yulianna Avdeeva, Emanuel Ax, Khatia Buniatishvili, Seong-Jin Cho, Hélène Grimaud, Evgeny Kissin, Igor Levit, George Li, Bruce Liu, Schaghajegh Nosrati, Maurizio Pollini, Beatrice Rana, Alexandre Tharaud, Jean-Yves Thibaudet, Daniil Trifonov, and Nobuvuki Tsuiii.

Vocalists in recital next season include sopranos **Sondra Radvanovsky** and **Fatma Said**; mezzosoprano **Samantha Hankey**; tenors **Lawrence Brownlee** and **Juan Diego Flórez**; baritone **Benjamin Appl**; and bass-baritone **Davóne Tines**.

Among the season's chamber music performances: **The MET Orchestra Chamber Ensemble** returns this season for its six-concert series with programming that aligns with operas presented this season on The MET's stage and musical collaborations with **Paul Appleby**, **Joyce DiDonato**, **Ryan Speedo Green**, **Joshua Hopkins**, **Eric Owens**, and **Yannick Nézet-Séguin**.

In December 2022, violinist **Itzhak Perlman** will be joined by musical friends—pianists **Emanuel Ax** and **Jean-Yves Thibaudet**, and the **Juilliard String Quartet**—for an evening of music by Leclair, Mozart, and Chausson. In February 2023, violinist **Anne-Sophie Mutter** and the **Mutter Virtuosi** play the New York premiere of Unsuk Chin's *Gran Cadenza* for Two Violins in addition to works by Vivaldi, J.S. Bach, and Saint-Georges. That same month, violinist **Midori** performs a solo violin sonatas and partitas by J. S. Bach.

In May 2023, an astonishing lineup of internationally renowned musicians including violinists **Gidon Kremer** and **Maxim Vengerov**; cellist **Steven Isserlis**; pianists **Evgeny Kissin** and **Lera Auerbach**; and the **Emerson String Quartet** comes together to celebrate the centenary of Andrei Sakharov—the physicist, humanist, and Nobel Peace Prize winner for championing universal human rights, disarmament, and peace, in whose name the European Union established the Sakharov Prize for Freedom of Thought.

Jazz performances next season include appearances by innovative pianist and composer **Helen Sung** with her ensemble and the infinitely versatile **Harlem Quartet**; as well as a performance by Grammy Award winner, drummer, and composer **Terri Lyne Carrington** blending jazz, indie rock, and hip hop with her sextet **Social Science**.

Among performances featuring folk/roots music: internationally celebrated Mexican singer **Natalia Lafourcade** makes her Carnegie Hall debut in Stern Auditorium / Perelman Stage; New York City's singular all-women mariachi group **Flor De Toloache** is featured on a Zankel Hall double bill with Latin Grammy-winning vocalist **Nella**; and Kurdish singer **Aynur** performs in Zankel Hall.

Multiple Tony and Grammy Award winner **Audra McDonald** makes her highly anticipated return next season, headlining an evening that incudes musical theater classics and lesser known gems. Popular music performances also include two Zankel Hall performances with singer-songwriter **Michael Feinstein**; six concerts with **Steven Reineke** and **The New York Pops** celebrating music from the worlds of Broadway and film, plus holiday classics; and the return of **A Night of Inspiration** with producer, bandleader, and music director **Ray Chew** leading a tribute to gospel royalty Richard Smallwood.

Of note: For the first time in many years, the Zankel Hall stage will be transformed into an in-the-round configuration, offering concertgoers a new and unique setting in which to experience music at Carnegie Hall. The Hall's flexible underground concert venue will be reconfigured over the course of eight days from January 19–27, 2023. Five performances spanning multiple musical genres have been programmed with the Zankel Hall Center Stage format in mind, including programs featuring yMusic; Third Coast Percussion with choreographers and movement artists Jon Boogz & Lil Buck; Claire Chase; Rhiannon Giddens and Francesco Turrisi; and Kronos Quartet.

Looking beyond the walls of the building and into the community, the **Carnegie Hall Citywide** concert series will return in summer 2022, offering free concerts in Bryant Park and venues throughout New York City, and continuing all season long. Partnering with local community organizations, the 2022–2023 Carnegie Hall Citywide season will include dozens of performances showcasing the best in classical, jazz, folk, Latin music, and more. The 2022–2023 Carnegie Hall Citywide lineup will be announced in late summer 2022.

Extending the reach of music-making on Carnegie Hall's stages to listeners around the world, Carnegie Hall and WQXR FM in New York will partner for a twelfth consecutive year to produce *Carnegie Hall Live*, an engaging live radio broadcast and digital series featuring performances from throughout the Hall's season. This year's series will launch on September 29 with Carnegie Hall's Opening Night Gala performance featuring The Philadelphia Orchestra under the baton of Yannick Nézet-Séguin. The full 2022–2023 broadcast schedule will be announced at a later date.

DETAILS OF CARNEGIE HALL'S 2022–2023 SEASON

Perspectives: Mitsuko Uchida

Pianist **Mitsuko Uchida** is one of the most revered artists of our time. Concerts throughout her three-season Perspectives series will highlight repertoire for which she is most renowned with her versatility, vision, and depth of interpretation showcased in solo and concerto performances, in her long-term collaboration with the Mahler Chamber Orchestra, and in public talks and master classes with aspiring musicians of the next generation.

Ms. Uchida launches her Perspectives in February with a solo recital in Stern Auditorium / Perelman Stage that features three late Beethoven sonatas. This program revisits the repertoire she originally performed 20 years ago as part of her first Perspectives series in November 2003 and again in October 2009. Ms. Uchida's Perspectives continues in March with a master class for young professional pianists, presented by the Hall's Weill Music Institute. Also in March, she returns to lead the Mahler Chamber Orchestra from the keyboard, performing concertos by Mozart, part of a multi-year survey of this area of the composer's works. In addition, performers from Marlboro Music—the summer chamber music festival of which Ms. Uchida is co-artistic director—make three appearances in Weill Recital Hall throughout this season.

Perspectives: Rhiannon Giddens

Grammy Award—winning singer-songwriter and multi-instrumentalist **Rhiannon Giddens** curates a four-concert Perspectives series as part of Carnegie Hall's 2022–2023 season. Ms. Giddens's spectacular banjo and fiddle playing, passionate vocals, and perceptive songwriting are all wed to a boundless musical curiosity that explores untold stories and reclaims American musical traditions for our time. Recently named artistic director of the Silkroad Ensemble and recipient of a 2017 MacArthur "Genius Grant" for exceptional creativity, her collaborative projects—including the Carolina Chocolate Drops, Our Native Daughters, a string of award-winning solo albums, among others—have made Ms. Giddens one the most vibrant musicians of our time.

Throughout her Perspectives series, Ms. Giddens sheds light on the shared history of a variety of musical traditions around the world, the complex history of Black influence in American music, and more. Beginning in October, she is joined by multi-instrumentalist and frequent collaborator **Francesco Turrisi** for an intimate concert in Weill Recital Hall that draws on diverse musical sources—such as American and Italian folk music, early Baroque songs, classical arrangements of African American spirituals, original songs, and deconstructed arias—to showcase the fluidity between classical and popular music.

Next in the series, Ms. Giddens joins three of her kindred banjo players, **Amythyst Kiah**, **Leyla McCalla**, and **Allison Russell** (all leading roots artists themselves) for *Songs of Our Native Daughters*. Drawing on historic sources and personal narratives, they bring to life stories of struggle, resistance, and hope from a powerful Black female perspective. Ms. Giddens and Mr. Turrisi come together again in January with bassist **Jason Sypher**, performing songs from their Grammy-winning album *They're Calling Me Home*, conceived and recorded in Ireland during the COVID-19 lockdown. Her residency culminates in March with *Indigenous Connections*, a stunning collaboration of global instrumentation and strings led by Ms. Giddens, featuring women and non-binary members of the **Silkroad Ensemble** and Tuscarora/Taino singer-songwriter **Pura Fé** that connects the music of indigenous North America to the world.

The Richard and Barbara Debs Creative Chair: Claire Chase

Award-winning flutist and innovator **Claire Chase** is holder of the Richard and Barbara Debs Creative Chair at Carnegie Hall for the 2022–2023 season. As part of her residency, she presents the continuation of *Density 2036*—her 24-year project to commission an expansive body of music for the flute—leading up to the centennial of Varèse's groundbreaking 1936 flute solo, *Density 21.5*. In 2023, Chase marks the 10th anniversary of the project. *Density* @ 10 will encompass all the music created to date, performed over 10 programs in New York City at Carnegie Hall and The Kitchen. In addition, she performs in a Zankel Hall Center Stage concert—a 360-degree experience created by artists and audience alike—and makes her debut in Stern Auditorium / Perelman Stage as soloist with the Helsinki Philharmonic Orchestra.

Ms. Chase's residency as Debs Creative Chair launches in January with a program that celebrates her mentor Pauline Oliveros in advance of what would have been the late composer's 90th birthday. The all-Oliveros program, which will be presented in Zankel Hall's Center Stage configuration, features performances from a variety of artists, including Chase, percussionists **Susie Ibarra** and **Tyshawn Sorey**, as well as special guests **IONE** (Oliveros's creative partner and spouse) and anthropologist **Eduardo Kohn**, among others. In May, she plays Kaija Saariaho's *Aile du songe* with the **Helsinki Philharmonic Orchestra** led by **Susanna Mälkki**. Also in May, she presents two concerts that bookend *Density* @ 10 in Zankel Hall, which include selections from the first two *Density 2036* programs and the latest installment, *part x*, which consists of the world premiere of a new work by Anna Thorvaldsdottir (commissioned by Carnegie Hall) that features cellists **Katinka Kleijn** and **Seth Parker Woods**, and pianist **Cory Smythe**. Additional events to be announced as part of Ms. Chase's residency include projects with the Weill Music Institute and Ensemble Connect.

Claire Chase is a musician, interdisciplinary artist, and educator. Passionately dedicated to the creation of new ecosystems for the music of our time, she has given world premieres of hundreds of new works by a new generation of artists. She is the first flutist to be awarded a MacArthur Fellowship (2012), and, in 2017, became the first flutist to be awarded the Avery Fisher Prize from Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts.

Additional 2022–2023 Season Programming Highlights

Orchestras

Carnegie Hall presents performances by 9 American orchestras and 7 international orchestras during the 2022–2023 season. Orchestral highlights include:

- Music Director Yannick Nézet-Séguin and The Philadelphia Orchestra open Carnegie Hall's 2022–2023 season with a festive program including music by Ravel, Dvořák, and Gabriela Lena Frank, and are joined by pianist Daniil Trifonov for Liszt's Piano Concerto No. 1. The orchestra returns for four additional concerts this season with programming that includes a diverse range of composers. In October, they present Clara Schumann's Piano Concerto with soloist Beatrice Rana and Price's Symphony No. 3 (a work featured on the orchestra's recent Grammy-winning recording) along with music by Ravel: Le tombeau de Couperin and Boléro. In December, their performance includes the New York premiere of Xi Wang's Ensō, Mozart's Clarinet Concerto with principal clarinetist Ricardo Morales, and Mahler's Fourth Symphony featuring soprano Pretty Yende. Celebrating the 150th birthday of Sergei Rachmaninoff, Yuja Wang joins the orchestra for an unprecedented program of all four of his piano concertos, plus the Rhapsody on a Theme of Paganini, marking the first time that the complete concertos will ever have been performed together at Carnegie Hall. For their final concert of the season, Maestro Nézet-Séguin and the orchestra are joined in March by Grammy Award-winning choir The Crossing for the New York premiere of John Luther Adams's The Vespers of the Blessed Earth, performed alongside Stravinsky's The Rite of Spring. (Sept. 29, Oct. 28, Dec. 13, Jan. 28, Mar. 31, SA/PS)
- The Sphinx Virtuosi, a chamber orchestra comprised of alumni of the prestigious Sphinx Competition, return to Carnegie Hall with a performance that culminates the 25th anniversary year of the Sphinx Organization. The program includes the New York premieres of Valerie Coleman's *Tracing Visions* and Jessie Montgomery's *Divided* (co-commissioned by Carnegie Hall) plus Montgomery's *Strum*, Carlos Simon's "Between Worlds," Villa-Lobos's *Bachianas brasileiras* No. 9, and excerpts from Beethoven's Violin Sonata No. 9 in A Major, Op. 47, "Kreutzer." (Oct. 13, SA/PS)
- Marin Alsop leads the São Paulo Symphony Orchestra in its Carnegie Hall debut with a program including Rimsky-Korsakov's Sheherazade and works by illustrious 20th-century Brazilian composer Heitor Villa-Lobos: his Preludio from Bachianas brasileiras No. 4; Harmonica Concerto, featuring Brazilian harmonica player José Staneck; and Chóros No. 10 with soprano Camila Titinger and the São Paulo Symphony Choir. Maestra Alsop and the orchestra return the following evening for a multimedia event, "Floresta Villa-Lobos," celebrating the Amazonian forest as a prime source of inspiration to Brazilian composers and to all of us. (Oct. 14–15, SA/PS)
- Music Director Mirga Gražinytė-Tyla leads the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra in the CBSO's first Carnegie Hall performance in 30 years. Their program includes Elgar's Cello Concerto with Sheku Kanneh-Mason along with the New York premiere of Thomas Adès's *The Exterminating Angel* Symphony (co-commissioned by Carnegie Hall) and Debussy's *La mer*. (Oct. 22, SA/PS)
- Music and Artistic Director Gustavo Dudamel leads the Los Angeles Philharmonic in the orchestra's first appearances at Carnegie Hall in more than 30 years. The orchestra's first concert features the New York premiere of Gabriela Ortiz's Violin Concerto with Spanish violinist María Dueñas in her Carnegie Hall debut, plus Mahler's Symphony No. 1. The following evening, Maestro Dudamel and the Philharmonic present the New York premieres of Ortiz's Kauyumari and Arturo Márquez's Fandango for Violin and Orchestra featuring soloist Anne Akiko Meyers alongside Copland's Symphony No. 3. (Oct. 25–26, SA/PS)
- **Kirill Petrenko** makes his first Carnegie Hall appearances as Chief Conductor of the **Berliner Philharmoniker**, leading three concerts in November. Mahler's Symphony No. 7 in E Minor is offered on two performances, bookending the series. For their second concert, Maestro Petrenko

and the orchestra perform Andrew Norman's *Unstuck*, Mozart's Violin Concerto No. 1 featuring concertmaster **Noah Bendix-Balgley**, and Korngold's Symphony in F-sharp Major. (Nov. 10–12, SA/PS)

- Pianist Seong-Jin Cho returns in a recital performing Handel's Suite in F Major, HWV 427; Suite in F Minor, HWV 433; Brahms's Variations and Fugue on a Theme by Handel; and Robert Schumann's "Drei Fantasiestücke," Op. 111; Symphonic Etudes, Op. 13. (Apr. 12, SA/PS)
- Italian pianist **Beatrice Rana** returns this season with a recital program to include J. S. Bach's French Suite No. 2 in C Minor; Debussy's *Pour le piano*; and Beethoven's Piano Sonata No. 29 in B-flat Major, Op. 106, "Hammerklavier." (Apr. 20, SA/PS)

- Pianist Khatia Buniatishvili makes her Stern Auditorium / Perelman Stage recital debut, performing Liszt's Prelude and Fugue in A Minor (after J. S. Bach); "Ständchen" (after Schubert); "Gretchen am Spinnrade" and "Erlkönig" from Songs of Franz Schubert; Hungarian Rhapsody No. 6; Beethoven's Piano Sonata No. 17 in D Minor, Op. 31, No. 2, "The Tempest"; Piano Sonata No. 23 in F Minor, Op. 57, "Appassionata"; and Stravinsky's Three Movements from Pétrouchka. (May 11, SA/PS)
- First prize winner of the 18th International Chopin Piano Competition, pianist **Bruce Liu** makes his New York recital debut with Chopin's Rondo à la mazur in F Major, Op. 5; Ballade No. 2 in F Major, Op. 38; Variations on "Là ci darem la mano" from Mozart's *Don Giovanni*; Piano Sonata No. 2 in B-flat Minor, Op. 35, Trois nouvelles etudes, Op. Posth.; and Liszt's *Réminiscences de Don Juan*. (May 19, SA/PS)

Jazz, Folk/Roots, and Popular Music

In addition to exciting classical music offerings, Carnegie Hall presents an array of concerts throughout the 2022–2023 season showcasing the best in jazz, folk/roots, and popular music traditions.

Jazz:

- Innovative jazz pianist and composer Helen Sung brings her extensive background in classical music
 to this special concert with her ensemble and the infinitely versatile, Grammy Award-winning Harlem
 Quartet to perform new original pieces by Sung. (Oct. 21, ZH)
- With a transatlantic mix of jazz, soul, and African pop, Somi has been called "the new high priestess of soul" (The Huffington Post), praised for "the earthy gutsiness of Nina Simone blended with the vocal beauty of Dianne Reeves" (Jazz Times). Her music sheds new light on subjects from the gentrification of African immigrant communities in Harlem to the lives of icons like her mentor, Hugh Masekela. (Nov. 18, ZH)
- Pianist-composer Samora Pinderhughes leads world-class musicians, composers, poets, and
 others in a new multidisciplinary work that explores the daily realities of violence, incarceration,
 policing, and detention in US communities. Combining musical compositions with audio interviews
 and raw testimonials, *The Healing Project* is an artistic celebration of resilience, healing, and
 resistance, co-commissioned by Carnegie Hall and produced by Anna Deavere Smith and Glenn
 Ligon. (Feb. 10, ZH)
- Grammy Award winner, drummer, and composer Terri Lyne Carrington blends jazz, indie rock, and hip-hop with her multi-talented sextet Social Science. This fresh ensemble thoughtfully confronts urgent social and societal issues through a suite of powerful compositions, inspiring a deep regard for humanity and freedom, while always exciting on a purely musical level. (Mar. 2, ZH)

Folk/Roots:

Internationally beloved Mexican singer and composer Natalia Lafourcade makes her Carnegie Hall
debut this season. For this special one-night-only performance, the multiple Grammy and Latin
Grammy Award winner introduces audiences to the pure, timeless songcraft that has earned her
legions of fans and universal adoration. (Oct. 27, SA/PS)

- Throughout her four-concert Perspectives series, renowned singer-songwriter and multi-instrumentalist Rhiannon Giddens shines a light on the shared history of a variety of musical traditions around the world, the complex history of Black influence in American music, and more. Beginning in October, she is joined by multi-instrumentalist and frequent collaborator Francesco Turrisi for When I Am Laid in Earth. an intimate concert in Weill Recital Hall that draws on diverse musical sources—such as American and Italian folk music, early Baroque songs, classical arrangements of African American spirituals, original songs, and deconstructed arias—to showcase the fluidity between classical and popular music. In November, Giddens joins three of her kindred banjo players, Amythyst Kiah, Leyla McCalla, and Allison Russell (all leading roots artists themselves) for Songs of Our Native Daughters to shine new light on African American women's stories of struggle, resistance, and hope. Giddens and Turrisi come together again in January with bassist **Jason Sypher**, performing songs from their Grammy Awardwinning album They're Calling Me Home, conceived and recorded in Ireland during the COVID-19 lockdown. Rhiannon Giddens's Perspectives culminates with a stunning collaboration of global instrumentation and strings where she leads women and non-binary members of Silkroad Ensemble and Tuscarora/Taino singer-songwriter Pura Fé on a musical journey that connects the music of indigenous North America to the world. (Oct. 15, WRH; Nov. 4, SA/PS; Jan. 24, Mar. 10, ZH)
- This special double-bill begins with New York City's singular, all-women mariachi group, Flor De Toloache, and their irresistible, boundary-pushing artistry. The evening continues with the musical storytelling of Venezuelan vocalist Nella, 2019's Best New Artist Latin Grammy Award winner. (Mar. 24, ZH)
- Aynur is a fearless artist and folk icon who freshly blends Kurdish and Western traditions, drawing upon
 centuries of musical and cultural history while also revealing the harsh realities faced today by Kurdish
 and Alevi people. "To hear Aynur's voice is to hear the transformation of all the layers of human joy and
 suffering into one sound," says Yo-Yo Ma. (May 5, ZH)

Popular:

- Founded in 1798, "The President's Own" United States Marine Band is a uniquely historic
 American ensemble. In this celebratory free event, the band adds a new chapter to its storied history
 with this impressively varied program that includes marches by the band's former director, John Philip
 Sousa; classics by composers including John Williams and Charles Ives; New York premieres; a suite
 of beloved showtunes by Frederick Loewe and Alan Jay Lerner; and much more. (Oct. 11, SA/PS)
- The New York Pops and Music Director Steven Reineke kick off the season in October with an exciting program featuring Tony Award winner Adrienne Warren highlighting her career on the stage including selections from *Tina: The Tina Turner Musical, Shuffle Along,* and *The Wiz.* In November, the orchestra pays tribute to the legendary Stephen Sondheim with a program featuring Nikki Renée Daniels, Matt Doyle, and Melissa Errico that celebrates Sondheim's inimitable songwriting career. The New York Pops's annual holiday tradition returns in December with two distinct special programs with singer-songwriter Ingrid Michaelson, featuring classic carols, contemporary selections from her holiday album, *Songs for the Season*, and other original hits. In February, the orchestra pays homage to the legendary *Star Wars* collection with a comprehensive program that includes selections from all nine movies in the epic saga, as well as the anthology series. Capping The New York Pops season, cabaret legend Marilyn Maye takes the stage in March, just prior to her 95th birthday, for a program of standards and music theater classics that make clear why she's been celebrated as one of America's greatest jazz singers for more than 50 years. (Oct. 21, Nov. 18, Dec. 16–17, Feb. 10, Mar. 24, SA/PS)
- Singer-songwriter **Michael Feinstein** returns with three concerts celebrating the American Songbook this season, bringing his suave vocalism, charismatic stage presence, and great guests to the stage. (Nov. 16, Feb. 15, Mar. 29, ZH)
- Multiple Tony and Grammy Award winner Audra McDonald makes her highly anticipated return, headlining an evening that includes musical theater classics and lesser-known gems. (Dec. 3, SA/PS)

 Producer, bandleader, and music director Ray Chew and his wife and business partner Vivian Scott Chew co-present A Night of Inspiration in tribute to gospel royalty Richard Smallwood. Along with special guest artists, the always-uplifting Chew performs a selection of Smallwood's best-selling music that has inspired so many listeners. (Dec. 10, SA/PS)

Family Programming

Carnegie Hall continues to expand its exciting programming for families and children in the 2022–2023 season, with wonderful opportunities for connection and creativity both in-person and online.

Highlights include:

- The return of **Musical Explorers Family Concerts**—presented for the first time since the Hall's COVID-19 closure—inviting families with elementary-age children to experience vibrant, highly interactive performances that celebrate music from diverse cultures around the globe. (Jan. 14 and May 13, ZH)
- **Spring Family Day**, featuring free, interactive performances and fun activities during a daylong open house for children ages 3–10 in the Resnick Education Wing. (Apr. 30, REW)
- This season, Carnegie Hall will further expand its digital footprint, offering new engaging ways for families and children to make music, including the release of new podcasts, musical games, and quizzes for kids everywhere. Children of all ages will have access through a new kid-friendly online portal to be launched later this year. The Hall also continues to offer engaging and playful activities for families everywhere through the online family resource page, including adaptations of the Hall's popular Link Up and Musical Explorers programs, and the sing-along video series Sing with Carnegie Hall. Season Highlights—Weill Music Institute

Serving more than 800,000 people in the coming season and nurturing musical talent at all levels, the wide-ranging music education and social impact programs created by **Carnegie Hall's Weill Music Institute** (WMI) are designed to inspire people to explore their own creativity. Programming introduces students and audiences of all ages to music, encourages musical learning and play within families, trains and supports aspiring artists and educators, and harnesses the power of music to make a meaningful difference in people's lives.

WMI looks forward to welcoming audiences, educators, aspiring musicians, and school groups to Carnegie Hall's concert halls and Resnick Education Wing for in-person performances, programming, and activities in the 2022–2023 season.

In addition to Family Concerts and its Spring Family Day, Carnegie Hall will welcome schoolchildren back to the concert hall for the first time since the COVID-19 closure for **Musical Explorers** and **Link Up** concerts, celebrating music from diverse cultures around the globe, having served these audiences through remote learning and with digital resources throughout the pandemic.

Workshops and Master Classes for professional young artists on the rise will also be offered. In December 2022, mezzo-soprano **Joyce DiDonato** returns to the Resnick Education Wing for her series of public master classes that focus on opera repertoire. In late January 2023, soprano **Renée Fleming** returns to lead **SongStudio**, a program for young vocalists and collaborative pianists that is designed to renew and refresh the presentation and experience of the vocal recital. More workshops are planned with

additional stellar artists, including pianist **Mitsuko Uchida**. Additional details regarding programs for teachers, students, families, aspiring musicians, partners, and more will be announced in fall 2022.

Beyond the walls of its performance venues, Carnegie Hall continues its work in justice settings with state and city agencies, including live music-making with men at Sing Sing Correctional Facility through **Musical Connections**. WMI also engages with teens and young adults through its **Future Music Project** and **NeON Arts** programs, exploring how the arts can be a powerful tool for self-expression and justice reform.

Next season, WMI also pilots a new workshop—**The B Side**—introducing young people (ages 16–24) to multiple aspects of the business side of the music industry. For aspiring artists and future music industry leaders alike, young people will learn essential skills and connect with performing artists, music executives, accomplished producers, songwriters, and more for a personal look into the industry.

Prior to the start of the 2022–2023 season, more than 200 of the finest teen musicians from across the country will gather at Purchase College, State University of New York, this July 2022 to form the Hall's three critically acclaimed **national youth ensembles**: the National Youth Orchestra of the USA (NYO-USA), NYO2, and NYO Jazz. The month-long training residency for these ensembles in July will include master classes, chamber music readings, and ensemble performances led by an all-star faculty of principal players from top American orchestras and esteemed jazz artists. This summer marks the first time since 2019 that all three ensembles will also have the opportunity to perform at Carnegie Hall and tour, serving as dynamic music ambassadors. Conductor **Daniel Harding** leads NYO-USA, with cellist **Alisa Weilerstein** as special guest, on a European tour. NYO2, a sister ensemble for younger teens, returns to Miami Beach for a five-day residency with the **New World Symphony** followed by concerts at Miami's New World Center and Carnegie Hall, led by **Mei-Ann Chen** and featuring pianist **Aaron Diehl** as soloist. Artistic Director and Bandleader **Sean Jones** returns to lead NYO Jazz, joined by vocalist **Jazzmeia Horn** as special guest. This summer the band embarks on its inaugural tour across the US, on the heels of the late spring 2022 release of NYO Jazz's debut album, *We're Still Here*.

Season Highlights—Ensemble Connect

The nine musicians of **Ensemble Connect**—the two-year fellowship for extraordinary professional classical musicians created by Carnegie Hall, The Juilliard School and the Weill Music Institute in partnership with the New York City Department of Education—will extend their fellowship into a third year due to the COVID-19 pandemic, continuing their work together through Carnegie Hall's 2022–2023 season.

The musicians' active performance schedule in 2022–2023 includes three performances in Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall featuring a range of chamber music from classical to contemporary, including the New York premiere of a Carnegie Hall-commissioned work by Michi Wiancko, plus music by Clara Schumann, Eleanor Alberga, Valerie Coleman, J.S. Bach, Ernst von Dohnányi, and more. Ensemble Connect also presents its fourth season of *Up Close* concerts in Carnegie Hall's Weill Music Room next season, exploring different approaches to presenting classical music by experimenting with concert formats, audience engagement, and multimedia. Beyond Carnegie Hall, the group will present engaging concerts in Paul Hall at The Juilliard School and other venues in New York City, and will present its biannual residency at Skidmore College in Saratoga Springs.

Ensemble Connect's school partnerships continue to represent one of the largest and most in-depth collaborations between a cultural institution and New York City public schools. Each fellow is partnered with an instrumental music teacher for a 25-day residency over the course of each school year, strengthening students' musical skills through a creativity-rich approach. The fellows' three years of

partnership with local students and educators will culminate with a Partner School Performance Festival at The Juilliard School in spring 2023 with more than 400 students participating in this celebratory event.

In addition to its work in New York City area classrooms, Ensemble Connect will presents 60 interactive performances in schools and 10 in community venues across New York City in 2022–2023, events that will invite audiences to explore and discover a piece of music or musical concept with listening activities and opportunities for interaction aimed at deepening and enriching the concert experience. Fellows give these assembly-style interactive performances for large, school-wide audiences, and adapt them for community venues including correctional facilities, senior community centers, homeless shelters, and organizations that support people with visual, intellectual, and developmental disabilities.

In June 2021, Carnegie Hall launched The Connected Musician—a self-paced interactive video series for collegiate and early professional performers—powered by Ensemble Connect. Featuring content from alumni of the program and leaders in the field, two video series are now available for free on carnegiehall.org with additional modules to be released in the 2022–2023 season.
