With “an exhilarating blend of precision and anarchy, rigor and bedlam,” **Sō Percussion** “has set the New York standard for percussion innovation” (*The New Yorker*). In this program of premieres featuring three new works co-commissioned by Carnegie Hall by leading American musical innovators, the ensemble celebrates the bi-directional impact of popular genres like jazz, tap, hip hop, rock, and disco on concert music and experimental composition. Bryce Dessner (*The National*) reintroduces the electric guitar-like “chord stick” that he invented for Sō Percussion. Pulitzer Prize winner Caroline Shaw writes a new percussion quartet, the next chapter in a multiple Grammy-winning collaboration that includes 2025’s Best Chamber Music / Small Ensemble Performance. **Michael J. Love**’s virtuosic tap dance transforms the group into an interdisciplinary percussion quintet. Kendall K. Williams imports Trinidad and Tobago’s high-octane “Panorama” style for a new quartet with marimbas and vibraphone.

Citizenship Notes

The string quartet is a “microcosm of democracy” in this visionary new program by **Brooklyn Rider**, “one of the wonders of contemporary music” (*Los Angeles Times*). The ensemble illustrates the idea through multiple centuries of music, starting with Haydn’s novel quartet writing—a reflection, perhaps, of societal shifts at play in the Age of Enlightenment. Violinist Colin Jacobsen puts his unique spin on a Civil Rights-era classic by Bob Dylan, and new premieres co-commissioned by Carnegie Hall by Don Byron, Ted Hearne, and Angélica Negrón directly explore questions of citizenship and democracy in the 21st century. The performance concludes with Beethoven’s heroic Third “Razumovsky” Quartet, which the ensemble suggests holds the “the ultimate representation of a musical democracy” in its fugal final movement.

What Is Your Hand in This?

Intrepid early music band **Ruckus** and pathbreaking singer **Davóne Tines** deliver the powerful bite of American revolutionary music, time-traveling through four centuries of songs, hymns, ballads, and newly commissioned works by Tines and Doug Balliett. It's an ideal meeting of artistic sensibilities, as Tines—whose eye-opening programming and vulnerable performances are “redefining the rules and rituals of classical music” (*San Francisco Classical Voice*)—meets the visceral might of Ruckus, known for combining a baroque band's questing spirit with the grit, groove, and jangle of American roots music as “the world's only period instrument rock band” (*San Francisco Chronicle*). As we reflect on the Declaration of Independence's 250th anniversary, this program asks: “How can this fragile American experiment hold? Can we find compassion for others? Can you find compassion for yourself?”

In 1934 at Carnegie Hall, Dawson's Negro Folk Symphony received its New York premiere, which was met with wild enthusiasm by audiences. Prominent critics called it “the most distinctive and promising American symphonic proclamation which has so far been achieved” (*New York American*). Tonight, **The Met Orchestra** offers a rare opportunity to hear this now-shockingly neglected work, which remains every bit as powerful today. Plus, hear Metropolitan Opera star **Isabel Leonard** in a favorite from *West Side Story* and Barber's gorgeous *Knoxville: Summer of 1915*. The concert concludes with the spirited *Fancy Free*, Bernstein's first collaboration with choreographer Jerome Robbins.

Dvořák’s “American” Quartet, written shortly after his “New World” Symphony, highlights the enormous impact Indigenous music and African American spirituals had on the composer while he lived in the US. The **Dover Quartet** puts this seminal work in context with the New York premieres of Jerod Impichchaachaaha’ Tate’s *Woodland Songs* (a recent “Premiere of the Month” in *The Strad*); and Tate’s orchestration of *Rattle Songs* by Pura Fé, two works co-commissioned by Carnegie Hall. “My native music is what it is because of [Ulali],” Tate told *The Strad*, and *Rattle Songs* is “the most influential piece in my life.”

Three-time Grammy winners for Best Choral Performance, **The Crossing** has been called "America's most astonishing choir" (*The New York Times*). In this concert, the group's "amazing, immaculate sound, both ethereally light and almost tangibly present" is used to stunning effect in Wang Lu's *At Which Point*, an arresting and delicate setting of Forrest Gander's Pulitzer-winning grief poems. In the New York premiere of *Singsong*, visionary composer Tania León sets to music the hard-edged "cricket poems" of US Poet Laureate (and fellow Pulitzer winner) Rita Dove, creating a rhythmically charged dialogue between the choir's kaleidoscopic colors and the virtuosic flute inventions of MacArthur Fellow **Claire Chase**. *Infinite Body*—by The Crossing's first-ever resident composer, Ayana Woods—probes a series of difficult questions and arrives at a shockingly joyful conclusion.

Louis Langrée Conducts Gershwin and Ellington

Louis Langrée conducts New York's own **Orchestra of St. Luke's** in an irresistible all-American program that opens with Ives's mystical short work, *The Unanswered Question*. Ellington premiered his *New World a-Comin'* rhapsody at Carnegie Hall in 1943, and its declarative piano solo is played tonight by dynamic jazz pianist **Gerald Clayton**. In 1955, Ellington's *Night Creature* was also premiered at the Hall, later reappearing on the exquisite Symphonic Ellington and choreographed by Alvin Ailey. Gershwin brought his own hand-selected Parisian taxi horns to Carnegie Hall for the premiere of *An American in Paris*, much to the audience's delight. The concert concludes with a powerful 20-minute suite from Bernstein's sole film score to the American cinema classic, *On the Waterfront*.

Echoes of Stravinsky resound in a unique performance by Carnegie Hall's musically omnivorous **Ensemble Connect**. Joan Tower's "Petrushkates" is inspired—as its name suggests—by both Stravinsky's *Pétrouchka* and the flowing motions of figure skating. Wynton Marsalis's *A Fiddler's Tale* reimagines Stravinsky's *The Soldier's Tale* suite, adding further emphasis to the composer's characteristic early-jazz ingredients.
