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NATIONAL YOUTH ORCHESTRA OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA LAUNCHES INAUGURAL RESIDENCY AND TOUR

** June 30 - July 21, 2013 **

120 Outstanding Young Musicians from 42 States and Over 100 Cities Come Together June 30 for Two Week Training Residency Followed by International Tour with Conductor Valery Gergiev and Violinist Joshua Bell

Tour: Concerts at Purchase College, SUNY and Washington DC's Kennedy Center, Great Hall of The Moscow Conservatory, St. Petersburg's New Mariinsky II, and Concluding at London's Royal Albert Hall as Part of the BBC Proms

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(June 6, 2013; NEW YORK, NY)—Beginning Sunday, June 30, 120 of the country's finest young musicians, ages 16-19, come together for the inaugural residency and tour of the National Youth Orchestra of the United States of America, a new annual tuition-free program created by Carnegie Hall's Weill Music Institute. NYO-USA's 2013 summer schedule includes five concerts in the US and abroad from July 11 to 21, with performances in Purchase, NY; Washington, DC; Moscow and St. Petersburg in Russia; and London, England.



"We're very excited to welcome the musicians of the NYO-USA for the first time this summer," said Clive Gillinson, Executive and Artistic Director of Carnegie Hall. "Though they come from every corner of the United States, all share a commitment to being the finest musicians they can be. We hope that this will be a life-changing experience for them, not just musically, as they train alongside their peers with some of the greatest orchestral players from around the US, but also personally, as they form friendships that last a lifetime and represent the best of their country around the globe."

Capping a two-week summer residency at Purchase College, SUNY, just outside New York City in Westchester County, in which the young musicians will train with section leaders from some of the country's best orchestras, world-renowned conductor **Valery Gergiev** will lead the NYO-USA in its first public performance with acclaimed violinist **Joshua Bell** at Purchase's Performing Arts Center on Thursday, July 11. From there, the orchestra embarks on its inaugural tour, starting in the nation's capital to make its debut at Washington DC's John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts on Saturday, July 13.

Following these two engagements, Maestro Gergiev, Mr. Bell, and the NYO-USA will travel overseas for two concerts in Mr. Gergiev's home country: in Moscow, at The Great Hall of the Moscow Conservatory on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>July 16</u> and, in St. Petersburg, at the recently unveiled Mariinsky II theater on <u>Thursday</u>, <u>July 18</u> as part of Gergiev's Stars of the White Nights Festival. The orchestra's first tour culminates with a concert at London's Royal Albert Hall on <u>Sunday</u>, <u>July 21</u>, as part of the BBC Proms. The NYO-USA's Proms performance will be broadcast live on BBC Radio 3 and recorded for a later television broadcast,

scheduled to air on BBC Four on July 26. WQXR will broadcast NYO-USA's BBC Proms concert on July 27 at 5:00 p.m. ET, bringing it to New York area radio audiences and online listeners worldwide at wqxr.org.

The orchestra's concert program for all summer 2013 performances includes Tchaikovsky's Violin Concerto with Mr. Bell as soloist; Shostakovich's Symphony No, 10 in E Minor; and *Magiya*, a new work by American composer Sean Shepherd, co-commissioned by Carnegie Hall and BBC Radio 3, specifically for NYO-USA. As part of their travel schedule, the NYO-USA players will also have the exciting opportunity to explore the cities in which they will be performing, as well as the chance to interact with local young musicians at stops along the way.

When the orchestra steps on stage for its debut, the musicians will sport a youthful, elegant, and fun take on traditional concert attire—including red trousers, black jackets with satin tonal details, and black canvas low-top Converse tennis shoes with white-stars patterns—styled by Fred Bernstein, courtesy of Macy's and Bloomingdales.

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Hailing from 42 US states and over 100 cities and towns, the 120 young musicians who make up the National Youth Orchestra of the United States of America have all been recognized by Carnegie Hall as being among the finest in the country following a comprehensive, nationwide audition process. James Ross, associate director of The Juilliard School's conducting program and director of orchestral activities at the University of Maryland, will lead preparatory rehearsals at Purchase and help shape the residency curriculum. Comprising some of the finest players and section leaders from America's greatest orchestras, the faculty will oversee rehearsals during the orchestra's residency in Purchase and will conduct master classes, participate in chamber music readings, and lead other seminars on essential music skills, all to help prepare the musicians for their international tour. Complementing rehearsals and instrumental coachings, orchestra members will also take part in workshops on a variety of topics from improvisation, composition, and conducting, to yoga, tips for international travel, and speaking about music to a range of audiences.

Purchase College, SUNY, is a key partner in Carnegie Hall's new NYO-USA initiative. During their two-week residency, orchestra members will be housed on Purchase College's scenic campus, located in Westchester County, just north of New York City, where they will undertake their initial training and rehearsals. All rehearsals will be centered at the College's highly-regarded Performing Arts Center and in the rehearsal studios of its School for the Arts Conservatory of Music.
