(*Update: October 1, 2012*, NEW YORK)—This fall, Carnegie Hall launches *Voices from Latin America*, a citywide festival from November 8 to December 11, 2012, inviting audiences to explore the incredibly diverse cultures of Latin America. Developed under the guidance of four internationally-acclaimed musicians serving as artistic advisors—composer **Osvaldo Golijov**, conductor **Gustavo Dudamel**, jazz pianist and composer **Chucho Valdés**, and singer, songwriter, and guitarist **Gilberto Gil**—the *Voices from Latin America* festival encompasses music, dance, film, photography, and visual arts of many regions with more than 70 performances and events at Carnegie Hall and partner cultural institutions, including particular focuses on music of Brazil, Cuba, Venezuela, and Mexico.

Voices from Latin America features Carnegie Hall performances by artists representing a variety of different musical traditions: Gilberto Gil, looking at Brazilian popular music; Chucho Valdés, exploring the development of Afro-Cuban jazz; and Gustavo Dudamel, focusing on the influential El Sistema movement in Venezuela, including an extended New York residency by the Simón Bolívar Symphony Orchestra of Venezuela. Carnegie Hall also partners with Celebrate México Now—the annual festival of Mexican art and culture in New York City—to present festival programs across the five boroughs of New York City, focusing on the music and culture of Mexico, culminating with a tribute to legendary singer Chavela Vargas at Carnegie Hall. Overall, Voices from Latin America offers a wide range of music including popular Brazilian styles such as samba and forró, as well as other traditional and folk music from Northeastern Brazil; Cuban rumba; Afro-Cuban jazz; and diverse genres of Mexican song, plus music from a variety of Latin American classical and jazz composers.

Through collaborations with other prestigious cultural institutions and a series of free Carnegie Hall Neighborhood Concerts in community venues, the reach of the festival extends throughout New York City, spanning different art forms, including music, dance, film, panel discussions, photography, and art exhibitions, providing insight into diverse Latin American cultures that continue to fuel the world's imagination. *Voices from Latin America* partners include: Abrons Arts Center at Henry Street Settlement, ACA Galleries, Americas Society, (Art) Amalgamated,

VOICES FROM LATIN AMERICA PROGRAMMING AT CARNEGIE HALL

Voices from Brazil: The Voices from Latin America festival launches at Carnegie Hall with a performance in Stern Auditorium/Perelman Stage by Gilberto Gil—one of Brazil's most revered and popular musicians (November 8, SA/PS). For this performance, the singer, songwriter, guitarist, and former Brazilian minister of culture returns to his musical roots with an evening of forró, the infectious dance music from Northeastern Brazil. Over the following three weeks, Carnegie Hall's Voices from Brazil musical offerings include programs created in collaboration with Gil, looking at the diversity and vitality of Brazilian popular music and its influence on global popular culture. These performances include: a concert of sambas and choros by Paulinho da Viola—Brazil's greatest living sambista—making his Carnegie Hall debut (November 28, SA/PS); Music From Northeastern Brazil—a double-bill program in which virtuoso flutist and improviser Carlos Malta plays with Pife Muderno, a performer of traditional flute and drum music—followed by virtuoso violinist Nicolas Krassik and Cordestinos with Friends performing a lively set of folk and contemporary music alongside several surprise guests (November 29, ZH); and a final double-bill concert—this one of contrasting Brazilian music styles—featuring Orquestra Imperial, a retro-chic homage to big bands from the 1950s playing a set of sambas and dance classics, after which poet and singer-songwriter Arnaldo Antunes performs an acoustic set with guitar accompaniment (December 5, ZH).

<u>Voices from Cuba</u>: Internationally-acclaimed pianist, composer, bandleader, and educator **Chucho Valdés**—the leading figure in contemporary Afro-Cuban jazz—pays homage to the genre and its worldwide influence by curating a series of Cuban-focused performances. Performances include: an all-star, four-piano concert featuring Valdés with **Egberto Gismonti**, **Danilo Pérez**, and **Gonzalo Rubalcaba** in a jazz program of solos, duos, and quartets (December 4, SA/PS); a program entitled *Afro-Cuban Jazz: The Younger Generation*, featuring rising star ensembles **Dayramir and Habana enTRANCE** in a double bill performance with the **Aldo López-Gavilán Quartet** (November 16, ZH); legendary folkloric group **Yoruba Andabo** ("friends of Yoruba culture") performing an evening of Cuban rumba with singers, percussionists, and dancers (November 30, ZH); and a performance by the **Chucho Valdés Quintet** (December 1, ZH).

Voices from Venezuela: Venezuela's Gustavo Dudamel has quickly emerged on the world stage as one of today's most exciting figures in classical music. For the festival's Venezuela series, Dudamel brings the Simón Bolívar Symphony Orchestra of Venezuela to Carnegie Hall for a residency that includes symphonic and chamber music concerts as well as a focus on his native country's influential *El Sistema* social-action education program. Performances include: the Venezuelan Brass Ensemble—drawn from the Simón Bolívar Symphony Orchestra—performing an exuberant program under conductor Thomas Clamor featuring works from Latin America and beyond (December 7, SA/PS) and a chamber music program entitled *Música nueva* with Members of the Simón Bolívar Symphony Orchestra of Venezuela and solo pianists Danilo Pérez and Gonzalo Rubalcaba performing the US premieres of four newly commissioned works for Carnegie Hall by Pérez, Rubalcaba, Enrico Chapela, and Esteban Benzecry (December 8, ZH). This performance is preceded by an afternoon event in Zankel Hall, Discovery Day: El Sistema, in which keynote speaker Dr. Leon Botstein and panelists Dr. José Antonio Abreu, and Gustavo Dudamel discuss with moderator Jeremy Geffen, Venezuela's successful *El Sistema* program and its influence on educational thinking in the United States (December 8, ZH).

The following afternoon, the **Simón Bolívar Symphony Orchestra of Venezuela** perform a Carnegie Hall Family Concert (December 9, SA/PS).

Musicians from the Simón Bolívar Symphony also perform in five Carnegie Hall Neighborhood Concerts in a variety of community venues throughout New York's five boroughs (see below). These concerts will culminate on December 12 at The DiMenna Center for Classical Music in a day-long *Seminario*, an intensive, project-based musical retreat where musicians share repertoire, streamline technique, and build personal and institutional relationships. WMI will invite 125 students and their teachers from area El Sistema programs, or "nucleos," for a full day of teaching and performance with members of the orchestra. The day is presented in partnership with the Orchestra of St. Luke's and designed collaboratively with local program directors including Harmony Program, Corona Youth Music Program, WHIN Program, UpBeat NYC, and Union City Music Project of New Jersey.

The *Voices from Latin America* festival closes with two performances on consecutive evenings at Carnegie Hall by the **Simón Bolívar Symphony Orchestra of Venezuela**, conducted by Music Director **Gustavo Dudamel** (December 10 and December 11, SA/PS). The orchestra's first program features Carlos Chávez's *Sinfonía india*, Julián Orbón's *Tres versiones sinfónicas* and Silvestre Revueltas's *La noche de los Mayas*. The second concert performed with the **Westminster Symphonic Choir** features Esteban Benzecry's Chaac (Maya Water God) from *Rituales Amerindios*, *Chôros* No.10 by Heitor Villa-Lobos, and Antonio Estévez's *Cantata criolla*.

<u>Voices from Mexico</u>: Carnegie Hall honors the song traditions of Mexico with *A Tribute to Chavela Vargas* in which three celebrated Mexican singers—**Ely Guerra**, **Eugenia León**, and **Tania Libertad**—join forces for the first time to pay tribute to the late, legendary singer in an evening of traditional and contemporary Mexican song (November 27, SA/PS). This program marks the cornerstone of the 2012 Celebrate México Now festival—an annual celebration of contemporary Mexican art and culture that joins with Carnegie Hall's *Voices from Latin America* festival this year to further extend the citywide focus on Latin American culture.

<u>Carnegie Hall Neighborhood Concerts</u>: A series of ten free Carnegie Hall Neighborhood Concerts—presented by Carnegie Hall's Weill Music Institute in community venues throughout New York City—invites audiences to experience a diverse range of music from Latin America in the city's five boroughs. This free concert series includes five performances by chamber groups drawn from the Simón Bolívar Symphony Orchestra of Venezuela. In addition, the series will present five concerts featuring artists and music representing a wide range of Latin American culture, including: Mexican-Paraguayan *jarocho* virtuoso Celso Duarte, Mexican jazz singer Magos Herrera, Cuban-born saxophonist Yosvany Terry Quintet, hot-blooded banda music ensemble Banda de los Muertos, and a concert by Ensemble ACJW performing the music of celebrated Latin American composers Heitor Villa-Lobos, Silvestre Revueltas, Ana Lara, and Astor Piazzolla.



Dear Friends,

A major exploration of the rich cultures of Latin America has always been central to our plans for Carnegie Hall's festival programming. Not only are these cultures fascinating in their own right, but also they are especially important when you consider the extraordinary influences they have had around the world. With *Voices from Latin America*, our next international festival, we set out on just such an artistic voyage with more than 70 events citywide this November and December, exploring captivating aspects of arts and culture from this part of the world, including Carnegie Hall programs that take a closer look at some of most compelling musical stories emerging from the region today.


At the heart of the festival are collaborations with four world-renowned joint artistic advisors, all of whom have been remarkably generous in giving of their time and talents. The great singer, songwriter, and guitarist Gilberto Gil—one of Brazil's most revered musicians—kicks off Voices from Latin America with a month-long series of programs that explore the diversity and vitality of Brazilian popular music, including a variety of traditional musical styles. Virtuoso pianist and bandleader Chucho Valdés, a seminal figure in jazz, has curated a series of concerts that explores the evolution of the Afro-Cuban jazz tradition, paying tribute to the music of his native Cuba. Gustavo Dudamel, the celebrated conductor who has taken the world by storm, developed out of Venezuela's El Sistema, an organization for which he now serves as music director. His festival programs with the Simón Bolívar Symphony Orchestra of Venezuela take a look at this revolutionary musical social-action movement with symphonic and chamber music performances both at Carnegie Hall and throughout the community, as well as a Discovery Day to encourage conversation. Argentinean-American composer Osyaldo Golijoy, who holds Carnegie Hall's Richard and Barbara Debs Composer's Chair throughout this season, was the first artist with whom we spoke about the festival. His profound insights into Latin American cultures were invaluable in helping to shape our overall thinking about this special programming, including musical focuses not only on Brazil, Cuba, and Venezuela, but also on Mexico.

Through partnerships with more than 20 great cultural institutions across New York City—including a special collaboration with the Celebrate México Now Festival—Voices from Latin America encompasses not only popular and classical music, but also visual arts, literature, dance, film, and photography, enticing audiences to take a journey that crosses multiple art forms. The festival invites all of us to consider the unique amalgamation of traditions that has resulted in one of the most exciting concentrations of cultures in the world today. All told, it is sure to be an intriguing celebration, one that we look forward to sharing with you.

Caros Amigos,

Uma importante exploração das ricas culturas da América Latina sempre esteve nos nossos planos para a programação de festivais no Carnegie Hall. Estas culturas não são só fascinantes por si próprias, mas também são especialmente importantes ao considerar as influências extraordinárias que elas tiveram no mundo inteiro. 


Gilberto Gil and the Popular Music of Brazil


A vast array of popular music styles have emerged from Brazilian culture: samba, choro, bossa nova, frevo, forró, MPB (Música popular brasiliera), pagode, and others. Many of these emerged from a mixture of Africa, indigenous, and Portuguese styles that are central to Brazilian culture and that have in return influenced artists around the world. Appropriately, *Voices from Latin America* opens with a performance by a Brazilian musical ambassador whose career encompasses many of these genres: iconic singer, guitarist, and songwriter Gilberto Gil, one of four artistic advisors of the festival. Gil has incorporated eclectic influences universal to Brazilian popular music into his own works throughout his career, echoed through his series of curated concerts at Carnegie Hall.

Beginning with his own headlining show, a celebration of his musical roots in forró, the series serves as a snapshot of the panorama of Brazilian music as experienced through Gil's eyes. It includes contemporary and traditional music from Northeastern Brazil performed by Carlos Malta and Pife Muderno, Nicolas Krassik, and Cordestinos; a double-bill of folk-pop fusion and retrochic 1950s samba performed by Arnaldo Antunes and Orquestra Imperial, respectively; and a performance by Paulinho da Viola, Brazil's greatest living sambista in his debut performance at Carnegie Hall.

For more than 40 years, spanning 52 albums and over four million records sold, Gilberto Gil has infused his songs with both musical innovation and political commitment. He is internationally regarded as one of Brazil's most revered musicians, whose career as an artist and political advocate is testament to the fact that culture can affect change. Credited as having a fundamental role in the modernization of Brazilian popular music, Gil tackles a wide variety of social issues in his lyrics, including inequality, racism, science, and religion. The mastery with which he explores these subjects makes him one of the Brazil's greatest composer-lyricists. From having helped to create the 1960s Tropicália movement, for which he was imprisoned and later exiled by the authoritarian regime, to later serving as Brazil's Minister of Culture, Gil is a musical ambassador with firm cultural conviction.

Chucho Valdés and Afro-Cuban Jazz

Drawing upon its cultural origins in Spain and Africa, the varied and distinctive musical styles tied to the island of Cuba have been influential throughout the world since the 19th century. Chief among them is Afro-Cuban jazz, mixing clave-based rhythms with jazz harmonies and techniques of improvisation. During Voices from Latin America, Carnegie Hall partners with Cuban pianist and bandleader Chucho Valdés-widely regarded as the greatest Latin jazz musician of our time—for an exploration of the Afro-Cuban musical tradition. As an artistic advisor for the festival. Valdés has curated a series that serves as a glimpse into the future of Afro-Cuban jazz with artists such as Dayramir and Habana enTRANCE, and the Aldo López-Gavilán Quartet-two rising ensembles of the genre; an evening of Cuban rumba with singers, percussionists, and dancers led by legendary folkloric group Yoruba Andabo; and two concerts where Valdés himself takes the stagethe first in performance with his own quintet and another with fellow jazz-piano giants Egberto Gismonti, Danilo Pérez, and Gonzalo Rubalcaba.

At a time when Cuban musicians such as Mario Bauzá and Chano Pozo began working with jazz legends like Dizzy Gillespie in the United States, young Cuban musicians—including Chucho Valdés started to create their own unique style of Afro-Cuban jazz in their native country. Using the foundations of their own musical traditions, they layered jazz with authentic Afro-Cuban folkloric, ritual, and religious rhythms and percussion. In the 1970s, the new sound hit the international stage when Valdés debuted his quintet at the Jazz Jamboree Festival in Poland, marking the first time a Cuban group participated in a jazz festival abroad, and garnering recognition for Valdés as one of the world's great pianists. Valdés and other young musicians soon formed the pivotal Cuban group Irakere, which helped forge a revolutionary new Afro-Cuban sound that featured an explosive mixture of jazz, rock, classical, and traditional Cuban music. The group, whose Carnegie Hall debut in 1979 was recorded for CBS Records and won a Grammy Award, is widely recognized as one of the most important ensembles in Cuban music history.

Believing in the power of music to create social change, José Antonio Abreu formed Venezuela's national system of youth orchestras, El Sistema, in 1975 as a way to bring music performance instruction to the country's largely poor, underserved children. Today, the social program reaches more than 300,000 children in over 250 locations throughout Venezuela. That its rise to prominence and high praise throughout the rest of the world has come only in the last five years—inspiring numerous other countries and communities to begin similar projects—can largely be attributed to the rise of El Sistema's first international star, conductor Gustavo Dudamel.

To conclude Voices from Latin America, Maestro Dudamel (one of the festival's four artistic advisors) brings the musicians of the Simón Bolívar Symphony Orchestra of Venezuela to New York for an 11-event series that includes five concerts at Carnegie Hall (including a Family Concert), five Neighborhood Concerts in community venues, and a special Discovery Day of talks and panel discussions that explore El Sistema and its influence on educational thinking in the United States. The Simón Bolívar Symphony Orchestra of Venezuela made its acclaimed New York debut at Carnegie Hall in December 2007 as the Simón Bolívar Youth Orchestra and now features the top professional players to have emerged from El Sistema. In addition to two concerts by the full orchestra in Stern Auditorium / Perelman Stage, the orchestra plays a Carnegie Hall Family Concert, members of the brass section perform their own concert, and other members play an intimate program of contemporary Latin American classical music in Zankel Hall.

Although named one of *Time* magazine's 100 Most Influential People in 2009, Gustavo Dudamel hails from humble beginnings in the small town of Barquisimeto, Venezuela. As a child, he began violin lessons, with his conducting studies beginning in 1996. The same year, he was given his first conducting position as music director of the Amadeus Chamber Orchestra. In 1999, he was appointed music director of the Simón Bolívar Youth Orchestra and began conducting studies with José Antonio Abreu; a few years later, in 2004, Dudamel



was brought to international attention by winning the inaugural Bamberger Symphoniker Gustav Mahler Competition. These early musical and mentoring experiences molded his commitment to music as an engine for social change—a lifelong passion. Concurrently serving as music director of the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Gothenburg Symphony Orchestra, and the Simón Bolívar Symphony Orchestra of Venezuela, the impact of his musical leadership is felt on three continents.

A Tribute to Chavela Vargas and Celebrate México Now

Voices from Latin America features a variety of events that celebrate the music and arts of Mexico. At Carnegie Hall, three dynamic Mexican singers—Ely Guerra, Eugenia León, and Tania Libertad—join forces to celebrate legendary vocalist Chavela Vargas in an evening of traditional and contemporary song. An icon in Mexico, Vargas rose to prominence in the 1950s and '60s as a singer of rancheras (traditional songs sung by one person with guitar) and other Latin American styles. 

Notable Latin American Debuts and Events at Carnegie Hall

Carmencita Perez at Piano

January 8, 1897

Venezuelan pianist, singer, and composer Teresa Carreño—a one-time student of Anton Rubinstein—makes her Carnegie Hall debut with the New York Philharmonic. She went on to appear 30 additional times before her death in 1917.

May 20, 1902

Theodore Roosevelt reads a speech at Carnegie Hall, welcoming the birth of the Cuban Republic.

December 16, 1916

Brazilian pianist Guiomar Novaes makes her Carnegie Hall debut with the New York Symphony Orchestra. Considered to be one of the greatest pianists of her day, she appeared nearly 50 times at the Hall with such conductors as Wilhelm Furtwängler, George Szell, and Leonard Bernstein.

June 27, 1920

Bandleader Xavier Cugat makes his Carnegie Hall debut as a violinist in the small recital hall. The Spanish-born musician spent his formative years in Cuba and was one the first musicians to popularize Latin music in the United States.

October 20, 1923

Chilean pianist Claudio Arrau makes his American debut at Carnegie Hall at the age of 20, performing nearly 70 more times at the Hall before 1988.

November 23, 1928

Argentine-born dancer La Argentina (the stage name for Antonia Mercé y Luque) makes her Carnegie Hall debut.

January 29, 1932

Cuban-born pianist Jorge Bolet makes his Carnegie Hall debut at the age of 17 under the baton of Fritz Reiner.

April 16, 1936

Brazilian soprano Bidú Sayão makes her Carnegie Hall debut with the New York Philharmonic conducted by Arturo Toscanini. The favorite singer of composer Heitor Villa-Lobos, she was a mainstay at the Metropolitan Opera from 1937 to 1952.


February 11, 1937


Mexican composer Carlos Chávez makes his Carnegie Hall debut conducting the New York Philharmonic in a program that included his Symphony No. 1.


March 9, 1940

Brazilian-born pianist Magda Tagliaferro makes her Carnegie Hall debut with the New York Philharmonic. She returned in 1979 to make her recital debut at the age of 86.









October 10, 1943

Cuban composer and pianist Ernesto Lecuona makes his Carnegie Hall debut conducting his orchestra in a program that included more than 20 of his songs, including "Malagueña" and "Siempre en mi Corazon" ("Always in My Heart"), which was nominated for an Academy Award in 1942.

February 8, 1945

Brazilian composer Heitor Villa-Lobos makes his Carnegie Hall debut conducting the New York Philharmonic in the US premiere of his *Chôros* No. 9 as well as *Chôros* No. 8.

April 7, 1947

Guatemalan Celso Hurtado performs the only solo marimba recital in the history of Carnegie Hall's main stage.

September 29, 1947

Cuban percussionist and singer Chano Pozo—the first in a long line of Latin percussionists in Dizzy Gillespie's bands—makes his Carnegie Hall debut during an event that also marked the Carnegie Hall debut of Ella Fitzgerald. This concert became widely regarded as a landmark event in the emergence of Latin jazz in the 1940s.

January 19, 1949

Chilean pianist Rosita Renard records Rosita Renard at Carnegie Hall.

March 7, 1949

Peruvian soprano Yma Sumac makes her Carnegie Hall debut during a variety show with more than 20 musicians, including Pete Seeger, Artie Shaw, and Harry Belafonte. She went on to headline her own concerts in 1954 and 1955.

June 6, 1952

Argentine singer and film actress Imperio Argentina records an album at Carnegie Hall. Born Magdalena Nile del Río, the singer changed her name after moving to Spain in order to honor her "other country."

May 10, 1953

A concert entitled *Folklore Music of Puerto Rico* presents 17 Puerto Rican musicians, including Tito Puente, the legendary percussionist and composer of New York City's Spanish Harlem known as "El Rey."

October 22, 1954

Cuban bandleader and singer Machito makes his Carnegie Hall debut at an event called $Mambo\ USA$.

January 20, 1957

Argentine-born pianist and conductor Daniel Barenboim makes his Carnegie Hall debut at the age of 14 with the Symphony of the Air conducted by Leopold Stokowski.

June 21, 1962

Festival Casals de Puerto Rico comes to Carnegie Hall. Spanish-born cellist Pablo Casals moved to Puerto Rico and began his annual festival there in 1957. In 1962, he brought the event to Carnegie Hall.

November 20, 1962

Puerto Rican baritone Justino Díaz makes his Carnegie Hall debut months before becoming the first Puerto Rican to win the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions.

November 21, 1962

In the first bossa nova concert in the US, Antônio Carlos Jobim, João Gilberto, and Sérgio Mendes create one of the most famous concerts and live albums in Carnegie Hall's history, leading to the bossa nova craze of the 1960s.

September 27, 1963


The Cuban-born "Queen of Salsa" Celia Cruz makes her Carnegie Hall debut. Between this date and November 13, 2000, she performed at the Hall 10 times.











March 20, 1964

Mexican singer and actor Pedro Vargas, known as the "Nightingale of the Americas," makes his Carnegie Hall debut and records the *Pedro Vargas En El Carnegie Hall* album.

October 9, 1964

Following the huge success of their smash hit "The Girl from Ipanema," Brazilian musician João Gilberto and American jazz artist Stan Getz come together to record a live album, *Getz/Gilberto #2*, at Carnegie Hall.

April 10, 1966

Cuban percussionist Mongo Santamaría makes his Carnegie Hall debut on a program with comedian Dick Gregory and singer Gloria Lynne.

May 11, 1966

Puerto Rican singer and guitarist José Feliciano makes his Carnegie Hall debut.

May 20, 1966

Cuban-born singer La Lupe makes her Carnegie Hall debut during a Cuban festival at the Hall that featured 30 musicians.

September 13, 1969

Dominican pianist and songwriter Rafael Solano records his album *Amor-Ama, Su Piano y Su Música Instrumental en Carnegie Hall.*

July 5, 1972

Argentine saxophonist and bandleader Gato Barbieri makes his Carnegie Hall debut during the first Newport Jazz Festival in New York City.

March 29, 1973

The Latin opera *Hommy* receives its world premiere at Carnegie Hall. Written by American salsa performer and producer Larry Harlow, the original cast features some of the greatest Latin jazz musicians, including Celia Cruz, Cheo Feliciano, Adalberto Santiago, Justo Betancourt, and Pete "El Conde" Rodríguez.

January 9, 1974

Cuban-born pianist Horacio Gutiérrez makes his Carnegie Hall debut in a recital of sonatas by Beethoven, Liszt, and Prokofiev.

February 20, 1974

Argentine pianist Martha Argerich makes her Carnegie Hall debut with the Minnesota Orchestra in a performance of Ravel's Piano Concerto.

February 25, 1974

Cuban-born pianist Jorge Bolet performs at Carnegie Hall, later releasing the recording *Live at Carnegie Hall*.

October 18, 1974

Brazilian pianist, composer, and producer Eumir Deodato makes his Carnegie Hall debut.

May 24, 1974

The Tico-Alegre All Stars—featuring Tito Puente, La Lupe, Ismael Rivera, and Charlie Palmieri—record a live album at Carnegie Hall.

May 7, 1977


Puerto Rican singer Danny Rivera makes his Carnegie Hall debut.

June 28, 1978

Cuban saxophonist Paquito D'Rivera, trumpeter Arturo Sandoval, and bandleader-pianist Chucho Valdés make their Carnegie Hall debuts. Their band Irakere is recorded by CBS and wins a Grammy Award for Best Latin Recording the following year.

June 2, 1984

Brazilian singer and guitarist Milton Nascimento makes his Carnegie Hall debut.



May 29, 1985

Within six months of each other, three of the originators of Brazil's *Tropicália* movement of the 1960s make their Carnegie Hall debuts, beginning with singer-guitarist Gilberto Gil.

June 10, 1985

Gilberto Gil's debut is quickly followed by fellow *Tropicália* singer Gal Costa in her Carnegie Hall debut.

September 24, 1985

Singer and guitarist Caetano Veloso becomes the third *Tropicália* luminary to make his Carnegie Hall debut in 1985.

October 26, 1985

Panamanian singer Rubén Blades makes his Carnegie Hall debut.

October 15, 1987

Argentine singer Mercedes Sosa, known as "La Negra," makes her Carnegie Hall debut.

June 1, 1989

Celia Cruz and legendary Cuban band Sonora Matancera record *Live! From Carnegie Hall*.

October 8, 1990

Mexican choreographer Amalia Hernández and her Ballet Folklórico de México make their Carnegie Hall debuts.

March 23, 1995

Puerto Rican bandleader Gilberto Santa Rosa—also known as "El Caballero de la Salsa" ("The Gentleman of Salsa")—records En Vivo Desde El Carnegie Hall.

November 13, 1997

Cuban-born singer Gloria Estefan makes her Carnegie Hall debut, performing with the Carnegie Hall Jazz Band.

July 1, 1998

Members of Cuba's legendary Buena Vista Social Club make their Carnegie Hall debuts, later the subject of the award-winning documentary by Wim Wenders and a live recording. Featured artists include Ibrahim Ferrer, Omara Portuondo, Rubén González, Compay Segundo, Manuel "Guajiro" Mirabal, Barbarito Torres, and Jesus Ramos.

February 5, 1999

Puerto Rican singer Danny Rivera records En Vivo Desde El Carnegie Hall.

April 7, 2003

Argentine-born composer Osvaldo Golijov is featured in Carnegie Hall's *Making Music* series of conversations with and performances of music by leading contemporary composers.

September 15, 2003

Renowned Mexican singer Chavela Vargas records her album *Chavela at Carnegie Hall*.

April 14-18, 2004

Caetano Veloso curates a Carnegie Hall Perspectives series, during which his invited guests include singers Mart'nália, Virginia Rodrigues, and David Byrne.

November 11, 2007

Venezuelan-born conductor Gustavo Dudamel, a product of his country's renowned El Sistema social-action educational program, makes his Carnegie Hall debut conducting the Simón Bolívar Youth Orchestra of Venezuela.
